



Green Heritage Challenge – Finchley

Make sure you take pictures of all the clues that you solve!

Clue 1

This feature was installed in 2014, in memory of a former local resident. Find somewhere you can sit next to a Goon in the garden.

Clue 2

A castellated area constructed in the 19th Century to make the house self-sufficient, including the addition of an abattoir and dairy! It is one of the earliest non-Roman concrete structures in England.

Clue 3

This structure is part of what used to be a Royal Airforce hospital. (Before becoming a RAF hospital, the house was built in 1859 by the Rev. Edward Cooper, then later owned by the ink manufacturer Henry Charles 'Inky' Stephens). It was used to look out for local bomb sites in WWII.

Clue 4

Find a structure in the garden that is 9 metres tall and was built to provide the house with pure water. This structure represents Stephens' interest in water supplies, which was later shown when he established The Cholderton and District Water Company.

Answer:

Clue 5

Find a birdhouse in a tree that is native to the South East of the USA. In 1963 it was named as Louisiana's state tree. This type of tree can reach over 40 metres tall.

Answer:

Clue 6

Stephens created a water harvesting system in his gardens, once again demonstrating his interest in water supply. Find somewhere that is fed to this day by Stephens' system.

Answer:

Clue 7

This is a type of vascular plant, said to remove chemical pollutants from the atmosphere. Some can be found near the waterfall, here in the gardens.
