Clue 1

This is One London! A fine entrance to the Park home to the Duke of Wellington, whose statue by Richard Westmacott stands nearby. Can you get a photo of this magnificent building?

Clue 2

A controversial statue when it was placed here! The bronze was cast from cannons captured from Wellington's campaigns. The Ladies of England who commissioned it were horrified. The small fig leaf installed to save offence was returned to the Park Superintendent after it had been stolen in the 1980s.

Clue 3

Music sweet music – find a place that you would expect to find musical performances. It was originally erected in 1869 in Kensington Gardens until it was moved to Hyde Park in 1886.

Modern architecture of great merit – constructed in 1965, designed by Patrick Gwynne it replaced the Ring Tea House. You can still pop in for a lovely cuppa with a wonderful view of the Serpentine Lake.

Who was responsible for creating the Serpentine Lake? There is an urn commemorating her. It was unveiled by HM the Queen in 1990. Find it and take a snap!

This track was established by William III at the end of the 17th century. Having moved court to Kensington Palace, William wanted a safer way to travel to St. James's Palace.

Clue 7

Find the plaque which tells you how many visitors attended the Great Exhibition of 1851. There were 7381 British Isle and Empire Exhibitors and it was there over 5 months.

These magnificent gates were made for the Great Exhibition and were relocated in 1871 to this location (technically in Kensington Gardens).
